BY THE TIME YOU READ THIS column, the machinery of "Christmas, Incorporated" will be in full swing, much of it designed to pull at our heart strings in ways that have nothing to do with the birth of Christ. At the same time, the city of

Bethlehem finds itself (yet again) at the center of international politics as the Israel and Hamas find themselves at war in a place that the world refers to as "holy." "Peace" is an elusive goal, and for all that we have progressed since that "silent night" two thousand years ago, it seems that we are right back at the start: conflict, war, international anxiety, terrorism, and death surround the manger while amidst it all—so say Christian people—the "Prince of Peace" is born. This year, more than others in recent memory, should cause us to ask some questions about what "peace" even is, and how it comes about. The song of the angels ("...and peace on earth to those whom God favors") is particularly necessary this year.

The city of Bethlehem exists—today—in the Palestinian West Bank. It is home to the "Church of the Nativity," "the shepherds' field," and a gift shop on every corner that will sell you olive-wood nativity sets to take home. The Church (reportedly built over the site of Jesus' birth...amazing that it was found!) was built first in the 300's by the Emperor Constantine, and then rebuilt in the 500's under the Emperor Justinian. For 1700 years, this place has been a site of pilgrimage for Christians from all over the world who have come to pray and enter the mystery of Christmas in the warm desert sun. Most peculiar of all, the door to the church is particularly small: it is called the "Door of Humility," and stands just over four feet high and two feet wide. You have to crouch down to get into the church itself, stepping back in time not only to Christmas, but to a time when political powers used the site as a buttress to

their own power. The door was reduced to this size to keep people from driving their horses and cattle into the church, and—yes—to keep military powers out. The church has served (over millennia) as a place where Christians, Jews, and

Arabs all have found shelter within its safe walls as they have sought protection from the storms that rage outside. Each group has used the church as a prop; each group has

hidden there from danger; each group has embraced and hated others from this place of supposed peace.

But back to the door, which requires that we bend down to enter; it requires a certain humility to enter (hence its name). This Christmas, might this little door have something to teach us about how we approach the manger, and—in a larger sense—how we approach the storms that rage outside it?

As war rages in the Holy Land, I wonder if part of our Christian vocation might be to tend

the door. Not to shut it, or even to open it (that is God's job), but simply to help others and ourselves bend over in humility to find a place of refuge, or a place of safety, or a place to regain their strength. The truth is that so much of the last years have been exhausting: pandemics, crumbling nations, and now more war. Our job is to usher people *in* to the church to find peace, and to usher them *out* in order to—*with God's help*— build it. Either way, both those who are tired and those who are strong will need to crouch down to go through this door of humility to do the work ahead of them, with gentleness, with firmness, and with hope.

Hope is hard to hold on to these days, but Christmas is a reminder that it originates in God, not in us. If not, why would God have come crashing into a world that was a complete mess

(just like now); there *must* be something in God's view that is worth saving. Somehow, this tattered mess of a thing still possesses the image of the holy, and if God can hope enough to come among us as the child of Bethlehem, then we have no business giving up the ghost to despair. Hope, compassion, understanding, justice, understanding: all of them begin by stepping across the threshold of the door (whichever way we might be going) to seek peace.

Please pray for the Holy Land in these days, and especially this Christmas, for victims of terror and war who find themselves unwitting casualties in bigger games between powerful people and broken histories. Somewhere there, there is a mother and a father and their newborn trying to get through a door of some kind, having to bend over in order to hold on to hope and dignity and strength.

Pray for our Jewish neighbors. Pray for our Muslim neighbors. Pray for Christians in the Holy Land. Pray for the city of Bethlehem. Pray for those who lead nations.

Pray for the Church: that it may direct us toward the doors of humility and teach us how to bend over, most especially when we try to go through standing up and proud. No one gets through the door that way. Only bent over, and only in search of finding the song that the shepherds heard: "...and on earth, peace..."

May you and the world be blessed as we celebrate his birth.

ANNUAL MEETING DATE

The Annual Meeting will be held on **Sunday January 28 immediately following the 10:30 a.m. via Zoom only.**

COUNCIL CORNER + The Parish Council met in regular session (in-person) on Tuesday, November 14, and heard/took action on the following matters:

- The roof over Tiedemann Hall has been completed. The next step is to receive bids/ information on repair of the interior. This will happen in the New Year.
- Finances are on track for what was budgeted.
 We remain right on track to produce the projected deficit by the end of the year, and—though some expenses are up—so are some income streams.
- The Parish Annual Meeting will be held on Sunday, January 28 via Zoom. This will allow all members—no matter where they are—to participate.
- The Endowment Committee and the Finance Committee will meet in December. The latter will develop the parish budget.
- Sr. Stacie and Pr. Patrick have both begun the processes to go on sabbatical. This is dependent upon successful grant applications to the Lilly Foundation, and will begin—at the earliest—in the fall of 2024.
- SPR has donated over \$15,000 to the Hallie Q. Brown Foodshelf, which is the most we have given in many years. Thank you to all who have donated.
- As of printing, pledges continue to come in for our 2023 Stewardship Campaign. To date, \$328,446 has been pledged from 74 giving units. We expect more to come in, and the Parish Council will be following up with members who have not yet pledged.
- Discussion on cleaning the Parish rolls regarding members who have neither communed nor contributed (as per the Parish Constitution).

The Parish Council meets again for a brief meeting and Christmas celebration on Tuesday, December 12.
