


IN JUST A FEW WEEKS. Christians throughout the world will gather to celebrate the Lord's passage from death to life. The deep questions of life and death are ones that the church has been asking since a Friday afternoon

two thousand years ago, and the ways in which early Christians asked these questions remain the ways we continue to wrestle with our own mortality and the mortality of those with whom we are in deep relationship. No one escapes these questions, Christian or not; it is simply that Christian people ask them within the community of Jesus.

As I write to you, there is much to be anxious about. Unsettling changes on a national level join economic woes, while challenges closer to home (maybe in our own homes...) present the age-old question: in the struggle between death and life, who wins?

Life wins because of Jesus' resurrection. In Easter, God declares that death is an intolerable state: it cannot be allowed to exist, it cannot be allowed to flourish, it cannot (and will not) gain the upper hand. In Easter, there is no longer a question of "if" death is defeated (it already has been!). In Easter, the cycle of hurt and retribution which seem to circle in never-ending repetition is stopped. In Easter, we are called to settle into the promise of God's life that is imparted to us, all because of God's immense and – in our own lives - very personal love.

Life is all around you! If we are careful to look, there are signs of life around us peeking through the soil, ready to grow. Their seeds were planted long ago (in some cases, as Easter, two thousand years ago!), and their 'getting ready' for 'now' has been done in secret. Unseen and forgotten, God has not forgotten them, and it is no coincidence that Easter lines up with spring in the



the birth of newborns; committees are meeting to do ministry; new members are being called to be part of this community; old members are learning,

growing, changing. Life is on the move!

Indeed, the life of God is dynamic, and – in the face of anxiety and uncertainty - it may seem that the things I mentioned above are flippant or of small consequence. After all, how does a three-year old giving a high-five compare to great evil going on around us?

Answer: the cross. God is, of course, where God never should be: in small things that seem (like a manger, for example...), to be insignificant. The elderly member

who seems frail only seems so until we remember that they are living into a story far longer, far stronger, and far more durable than any challenges that come in particular seasons of life. The one who is struggling with a terminal disease may seem helpless until we remember that they are buoyed up by that same story (the story of God's life!). The one who is struggling mightily with their mental health may seem hopelessly lost until we remember that Jesus defeats the devil in the wilderness and is with each of us in our suffering. Grand national dramas may seem untouchable by the things of God, until we remember that we – as God's people – are changing things right on our own street corner by providing a roof over the heads of young people who have no place to sleep. If you want to see the kingdom of God (the kingdom of life!), you must look to the

# FROM THE CANTOR

As I write this column in mid-March, I am thinking a lot about *diakonia*, the Greek root word from which "deacon" is taken. Part of my Lenten

routine has been reading each morning chapters from a 2024 book Diaconal Studies: Lived Theology for the Church in North America. I also have been invited to serve as the worship leader and small group facilitator for a conference called "To Church and World: Called, Formed, and Sent to Bridge the Gap" the last weekend of March. One requirement

for ELCA deacon candidates is a formation in diakonia and deacon identity, and this event fills that requirement. I'm super excited to go hang out with 40 deacon candidates and deacon mentors for a weekend at Lutherdale Camp in Wisconsin!

One concept I have been pondering is the diakonia of the baptized. Despite what I learned in my undergraduate Wester Civ course, Martin Luther never used the phrase "priesthood of all believers." He does allude to a priesthood of the baptized, however, when he is railing against the Church for the idea that only those who had taken holy orders as priests or monastics had a calling from God to live a spiritual life. In To the Christian Nobility of the German Nation, he writes, "we are all consecrated priests through Baptism..." We have priests who are ordained to administer the sacraments, but we are all called to a spiritual life through our baptism.

I would like to extend that concept to include the diakonia of the baptized. Jesus modeled diakonia for us when he washed the disciples' feet, an act in which we are invited to participate on Maundy Thursday. There's a sense in which diakonia means "humble service," demonstrating the upside-down quality of the kingdom of God, where the last shall be first and the least is the greatest. In other places in the New Testament, the diakon- root words are used when the person serving has a mission from the church. In Acts 6, Stephen and six other men were chosen

to make sure the daily food distribution was reaching all the widows. Yes, their work had an element of humble service, but it also had the quality of being emissaries of Jesus, of bridging the

Church and the world.

So, baptized in Christ, you are called to live a spiritual life in God. And you are also called to live a life of service, bridging the church and the world. How can you do that? So many ways! God created us all to be the unique people we are with our own gifts. Almost any activity can be an act of service if performed with that

attitude! One way to serve in April to participate in Feed My Starving Children meal packing with our group on Saturday, April 5 from 9:15-11:30 at their site in Eagen (990 E Loane Oak Rd #136). There are 20 total spots available, for people ages 5 and up. Sign up at fmsc.org using the join code W2WE8K, or tell Sister Stacie you want to go. We'll go out for lunch afterward for anyone who wants more fellowship time, also an important activity into which the Holy Spirit calls us!

May you have a blessed Lent and joyful Easter celebration, and may you go in peace to love and serve God and your neighbor. After all, you've been baptized to do just that!



- Requested and received approval to hire an interim part time administrator to provide office support while the current administrator is on medical leave. He reported the addition of a new phone and wi-fi system, long needed and good news, that church attendance has been increasing.
- Chris Lyman, Treasurer, reported on January financial results. General offerings were lower than expected but that was offset by bell tower rental income. Expenses met current budget projections generally, remaining in the black.
