# STEWARDSHIP CONCLUDES NOVEMBER 10



For the past several weeks, you STEWARDSHIP 2024 AT ST. PAUL-REFORMATION have been hearing stories of

God's possibilities at St. Paul-Reformation. As we conclude this year's Stewardship Campaign, we hope that you will pray and consider deeply what SPR means to you and your life of faith. As we look ahead to our conclusion, we hope that you return your commitment card (either in-person or electronically) on **Sunday, November 10**. On that day, please join us for our Consecration Sunday Brunch that will run from 9-10 a.m. in the Lower Auditorium (it's a potluck, so...bring something to share!). To all who have helped with this campaign, thank you! To all who have given and will give again, thank you!

AS I WRITE TO YOU THIS MONTH. the United States is preparing for its presidential election. In the next few weeks, it is likely that the anxiety level of many will spike as they worry about the future, our institutions, and public policy going forward.

These fears are not without reason, and—no matter the result of the election—some will need time to reflect upon the intense emotions that have set the tenor for our national conversation in the recent past.

We are aware of this need to find peace amidst a fearsome storm. And, to that end, we will be offering two opportunities for you to do some contemplation on how God calls us to deal with intense emotions, real fears, and the temptation to believe that we are alone.

In the three Synoptic Gospels, each writer recounts the story of Jesus falling asleep in the boat while a storm rages around

the terrified disciples. Their question to the Lord, "Do you not care that we are perishing?" is one that Christians have asked for two-thousand years. In a time of crisis—no matter what it is—where is God? In a time of uncertainty and fear, where is God?

Each of us asks this question privately, especially in our personal lives as events and situations change. Some ask it on larger levels, determining that God is, in fact, not in the boat, and is not a thing to be taken seriously. Their conclusion is that if God were real, God would do something about the state of the world is, seemingly, a logical one. We want God to intervene, and when God does, we want God specifically—to work for us.

No matter what November's election may bring, I would urge you to think about spiritual resilience. How do we hold on to faith when the world seems to be coming apart around us? How do we remain faithful when the nation is so divided and people literally hate the "other side?" How do we balance the work of justice and mercy with the command to love our neighbor, no matter who they are?

The answer to these questions will take you

a lifetime to iron out. If you figure out the recipe for the secret sauce, please let me know ASAP! But you, like Christians for two thousand years, are more likely to find the answer already

among you: Jesus is present. The incarnate God does not leave the world alone. The incarnate God does not leave the church alone or the people in it. The incarnate God does not leave alone the people outside the church. "The nations make much ado, and the kingdoms are shaken" says Psalm 46, andthese days—the kingdoms are shaking. In that same Psalm, God speaks at the end: "Be still, and know that I am God."

In some Lutheran Churches, particularly of Danish descent, a little wooden ship is often hung in the nave. The point was to remind people that the church—like the ship—sails on. The people in it, though battered and bruised by the waves, are not alone: Jesus is with them. The ship will not sink, no matter what "kingdoms are shaken." The little ship will not stop taking on those looking for refuge, nor sailing to the places of justice and mercy. The little ship will find people floating in the water who have been cast overboard and forgotten: and it will give them safety. This is not of its own doing. It is because the presence of the Lord in the boat.

This truth can, I hope, give you some resilience as we look beyond election day. Many Christians have had to navigate the waters of intense emotions, and they have not been abandoned by God. Neither will God abandon us. Remember what Jesus says: "I am with you always, even to the close of the age." Ages may be closing and new ones beginning, but this reminder should

be always in our sights. And, to that end, I invite you to join us for the two events I mentioned above:

- Church open on Election Day from 9:30 a.m. until 4:30 p.m. Come, sit, pray, and listen for the God who is in the boat with us.
- Election Season Prayer and Reflection on Thursday, November 14 from 7-8 p.m. This is not a time to talk politics, but it is a time to speak about how we process fear, anxiety, resiliency, and hope. Again: Jesus is in the boat with us. We meet in the West Transept.

No matter what the future brings, we remember the words of Paul to the Philippians: "Jesus is Lord." Indeed, he is in the boat with us.

#### FROM THE CANTOR

Music for Flute and Organ is back with a spiffy new name: Flauto Dolce. In 2018 I put out a call on Facebook for a flute player to come play along with a choral anthem on a random Sunday. Donna Hryniewicki answered, we hit it off, and we've been playing together ever since. She holds a doctoral degree in flute performance, and never fails to impress me with her technique and musicality. We decided we needed to name our duo, and landed on Flauto Dolce because it's a term for a historic flute as well as an organ stop. This time we are experimenting with offering the same concert twice in one day, on Friday, November 8 at noon and 7 p.m. We know there are people who can't make it to a noontime recital, and people who prefer not to be out after dark, so come and hear some great music at the time that works best for you!

One piece we will play is the "Hamburger" Sonata by Carl Philip Emmanuel Bach (1714-1788), the second surviving son of Johann Sebastian Bach and his first wife, Maria Barbara. CPE was born in Weimar, but by the time he was ready for school, the family lived in Leipzig and he attended the

Thomasschule, the same school where his father taught. After graduation in 1738, he won a position as keyboard player in the Berlin court of Crown Prince Frederick of Prussia, the future Frederick the Great. He composed and performed extensively in his three decades there. In 1768, he was able to negotiate leaving the court to take over his godfather Georg Philip Telemann's position as church musician in Hamburg - hence the origin of the nickname "Hamburger" for the sonata we will play. That year he also received the honorary title of courts composer to Frederick's sister, Princess Anna Amalia, a great patron of music and composer herself. You might recall that

Donna and I performed one of her sonatas last year. CPE Bach's music was written during a transitional period in music. The sonata we will play shows traits of the earlier Baroque period, such as the use of basso continuo, in which the keyboard player improvises the accompaniment over a composed

bass line, but it also sounds more like the Classical era in its harmony and melodic structure. The opening Allegretto movement is florid yet refined, and the Presto movement is sprightly and features cute echoes of the flute melody in the accompaniment.

Another piece on the program is "Arioso and Rondo patetico" by Gustav Jensen (1843-1895). Jensen was born in Köngisberg in the province of East Prussia, territory that lies between present-day Poland and Lithuania and which belonged to the Soviet Union after World War II. He studied violin and composition in Berlin, and became a counterpoint teacher at the Music Conservatory in Cologne, where he spent the rest of his life. In 1881 he won a composition competition with a cello sonata, beating out a then-seventeen-year-old Richard Strauss! The piece we are playing shows aspects of the Romantic era in

music in its dynamic contrasts and heroic ending.

We will also play music from the 20th century: Aaron Copland's "Vocalise" and Ralph Vaughan Williams "Studies in English Folk Song." You might recognize the tune "King's Lynn" in this set as the same tune to which we sing the great Fred Pratt Green text "When Jesus Came to Jordan." Come and join Flauto Dolce for some flutey goodness!

## NATIONAL LUTHERAN NATIONAL CHOIR CHRISTMAS


Saturday, December 14 at 1:30 p.m. + Every December,

Congratulations to SPR member Linda Dahlen who was the 2024 UMMAA Distinguished Alumni Award Recipient. The award honors UMN-Morris alumni who have made noteworthy contributions in their professional lives or in service to the University. A civil rights

advocate, lawyer, environmentalist and novelist, Dahlen's nominators call her a "strong role model for what UMM stands for," and point to her "lifelong work to further equality and fairness for everyone." Linda had a distinguished career with the MN Department of Transportation, particularly for the State and Federal Awarded "Seeds" outreach program she created; it provides collegelevel student worker positions to highly motivated minority or economically disadvantaged college students. In the past few years, Linda has worked with UMM to preserve a gift of land as a conservation habitat for the protection of native plants, animals, and insects, available for UMM research.
