As we look ahead, please plan on joining us on Sunday, November 10th (Consecration Sunday) as we celebrate all that the past year has accomplished at SPR...and what the future holds! support over 100 children and youth in our partnership with El Salvador, a partnership that has now been part and parcel of our lives (and the lives of our friends at Christ the Liberator) for over fifteen years. In October, SPR will be sending another delegation to El Salvador to bring our greetings, to accompany our siblings in that place, and to deepen the ties of friendship that bind us together in Christian love. This trip will include new members of SPR and old ones, all of whom will learn together.

Global partnerships are just one way that the gifts of this community are making a difference. While we support this work in El Salvador, the financial gifts that you give to SPR are also accomplishing other things of which you may not be aware; your impact reaches far and wide, and some highlights are worth mentioning.

This past August, the St. Paul-Area Synod opened its East Side Preschool in partnership with LSS. Intended to be a safe learning space for immigrant families, this preschool is specifically designed to work with families and children who are fleeing from national trauma. Research has shown that early intervention in the lives of children with traumatic pasts can interrupt cycles that can bring down entire families for generations. This has been a bold vision on behalf of the Synod, and the preschool—completely full—already has a waiting list for those interested in participating. Each congregation of the St. Paul Area Synod—including SPR—has donated to this project, making this work possible in ways that will extend the love of Christ to neighbors we may never meet. Did you know that you help run a preschool? You do!

But that is not all. Just two weeks ago (as I am writing to you), SPR donated fifty “street kits” to homeless youth who are living in the city of St. Paul. Each of these kits contained hygiene

products for teens who—for various reasons—do not live at home. With these kits come resources for safety, for shelter, and for help. These, too, are distributed (literally) just down the street from SPR.

And there is more...

SPR will once again host the Women’s Warming Hub this winter, now in its third year. After a steep learning curve in the first year, last year’s shelter went much better. We look forward to welcoming these guests again in the cold Minnesota winter months, and “warm hearts” at SPR also extends to “warm nights” amidst dangerous temperatures. Intended to be “low barrier” for entry, some guests have experienced (or are experiencing) extremely difficult circumstances. By “welcoming all, as Christ,” we seek to live what we say: that all are welcome.

As I write to you, the wonderful leaders of Meals Ministry are already prepping to care for SPR members through the ministry of hospitality this Saturday. Their labor of love does not only provide food to our ill or shut-in members, it creates bonds of community among those who help. “In giving, we receive” is eminently true.

Closer to home, SPR has welcomed new members from various religious backgrounds into this parish community. Some of these have been lifelong Lutherans, while others have found their way to this place via other routes, led by the Holy Spirit to live out their faith here. From young families to single people, SPR has welcomed these people with open arms, and we are excited to learn from them as they help us all to remain faithful members of Christ’s Body.

We could go on and on, and these highlights are only scratching the surface (truly) of the many ministries that occur at SPR. As we head into what promises to be a stressful political season in our

nation's life, I urge you to remain focused on these examples of "good" in our midst. God is doing good things here, and you are a part of that story no matter if you have been in this parish your whole life, or are just getting on board. We work together to make a difference, and we will not buy into the notion that "good" is not possible or that love of neighbor is simply too hard. It is not. It is, in fact, our work as Christian people, and your gifts help us to do that.

As we move through this campaign, I hope you will join me in increasing your pledge for the coming year. God has been good this past year at SPR, and the blessings that we have received as individuals and families are for the purpose of sharing. Let us share. Let us do the good work of Christ Jesus. Let us "proclaim liberty to the captive and the year of the Lord's favor," because "...with God, all things are possible."

OCTOBER 26 IS THE DAY WE

commemorate three important hymnwriters of the church: Philipp Nicolai, Johann Heermann, and Paul Gerhardt. They were all pastors who served in German-speaking lands, but it's important to remember that Germany is still centuries away from being a unified country.

Philipp Nicolai (1556-1608) was born in Waldeck in Central Germany and served as a pastor in the town of Herdecke, where he was at odds with the Roman Catholic town council, and fled to Unna in Westfalia. This was a region where there was a lot of Calvinist influence, and Nicolai wrote on the real presence of Christ in the Eucharist. But worse than theological conflict, Nicolai had to contend with the plague: in 1597, he conducted as many as thirty funerals a day! But during this time, he still had the time and inspiration to write "Wake, awake, for night is flying" and "O Morningstar, how fair and bright," known as "the king and queen of chorales."

Johann Heermann (1585-1647) lived his life in a German-speaking Lutheran part of the Holy

Roman Empire that is present-day Poland. He was his parents' only surviving child, and grew up to fulfill his mother's promise that if her son survived, he would become a pastor. He was able to serve only from 1611-1634 due to ill health and throat infections that caused him to lose his voice frequently. Retirement from preaching duties gave him more time to write hymns, though, three of which are in ELW and one of which, I feel, is an absolute requirement for Good Friday: "Ah, holy Jesus." His work demonstrates a transition point from early didactic Lutheran hymns meant to teach theology to more personal, subjective themes, such as this stanza:

*For me, kind Jesus, was thine incarnation,
Thy mortal sorrow, and thy life's oblation;
Thy death of anguish and thy bitter passion,
For my salvation.*

Paul Gerhardt (1607-1676) served in the area around Berlin, and also lived a life marked by the tragedy of the Thirty Years' War and the deaths of four of his five children and his wife. He lost his pastorate after standing up for Lutheran orthodoxy. He wrote lengthy multi-stanza hymns that were meant to be broken up and used at different times throughout the worship service. Eight of his hymns are included in ELW, including "O sacred head, now wounded." Like Heermann, Gerhardt uses lots of first-person language in his hymns. Considering the great difficulties of his life makes the assurance of this stanza even more extraordinary:

*If God my Lord be for me, I am a host defy;
For when I pray, before my foes, counfounded fly.
If Christ, my head and master, befriend me from above,
What foe or what disaster can drive me from his love?*

Amen! May we all rest in such confidence!

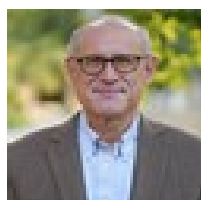


October 6
