An older festival than Christmas itself, Epiphany celebrates the "manifestation" of Jesus to the world. This is actually a threeweek theme: the arrival of the magi (the first manifestation), the Baptism of the Lord in the Jordan (the second manifestation), and finally the first miracle at Cana (the third manifestation). This triptych forms the Church's oldest celebrations of the meaning of Jesus' birth. This year, SPR will celebrate our annual observance of Epiphany as a Vigil service (the evening before), on **Friday, January 5, 7:00 p.m.** What is Epiphany without food? Magi are hungry after a sojourn with a star, and so we invite you to bring an appetizer to share for our 6:00 p.m. Epiphany reception in Tidemann Hall. This is simply a time of fellowship and joy as the "twelfth night" passes and we continue to celebrate the birth of Jesus. See you there!

FROM THE PASTOR

EPIPHANY holds a special place in my heart. The first time I celebrated Holy Communion was on Epiphany, and every year, this oft-forgotten feast day reveals new treasures (no pun intended) as the Church moves from its celebrations of the nativity

into the proclamation of the Gospel: God is with us, and we best live like that is true. Our lives announce it, and the integrity of Christian people makes this assertion believable and in-line with the claim that the Epiphany makes.

As I write to you however, the world continues to be at war; and as of mid-December, the deathtoll in Israel/Palestine has surpassed 19,000 people, 70% of them women and children. Evil begets evil begets evil begets evil, and the cycle of human brokenness continues in ways that make our recent celebrations of Christmas seem—if not flippant—at least out-of-step with the very geography of Bethlehem's location these days.

What is to be done?

There are, of course, no easy

answers, and the story of the Epiphany is one that is on "repeat" through the ages forever. A jealous Herod (read: those who seek power) are out for blood, and will wage war against the innocent to establish it firmly. Herod, after all, killed his own children when they became a threat to him. The tragic part is, of course, that I am not speaking of one side in this conflict or the other; or even the current conflict specifically. The story is old; it is repeated in a thousand different variations in places from Ukraine to Yemen to El Salvador. The "Herods" come in many forms: gangs, terrorist organizations, governments, politicians who dither while people die, those who simply can't be bothered to learn the intricacies of various conflicts or their history.

Within all of this—and within all of these conflicts—is the Holy Family. They, too, take on

various guises, and it is important to remember (as we have been reminded before) that the Holy Family was, themselves, a refugee family seeking safety for their future and fleeing their particular Herod. The Holy Family is an Israeli family living on

> a Kibbutz; it is a Palestinian family in a hospital seeking emergency medical care; it is an Ethiopian family caught up in that country's civil war, that—in these days—is intensifying. It is the

family held at the border and the family that is dealing with opiate addiction who is keeping the secret hidden from everyone that they know. The Holy Family is all across the world; and in our own pews.

Into this, breaks the "epiphany" of hope: Christ himself. We're not talking about some kind of pie-in-the-sky "idea" that the Church just holds as a sentimental nod to an ancient story. We're talking about an epiphany that though old—must have useful and use-able implications for now. The question follows: can an ancient story of seekers and stars and

Herods and divinity find a home among us now?

We say yes. Not because the particulars are terribly different (see above), but because the themes of the Epiphany are timeless and timely. People seek safety: *check*. People look for a sign to lead them: *check*. Herod rages: *check*. Treasures are spread far and wide to offer praise: *check*. Jesus Christ—the Epiphany of the Trinity continues to live among God's people and to be with God's people: *check*.

All of these things remain constant and true, and I suspect that our vocation as Christian people is to direct all these broad themes toward a greater one: hope. All is not lost, though sometimes it may seem so. All is not despair, though sometimes it may seem so. All is not cynicism and "the art of the possible;" God is making all things new. This includes a world that

must be transformed by the re-creating power of new life and new hope, symbolized most profoundly in the incarnation that we celebrate at Christmas and Epiphany, but also that we celebrate in the gathered assembly and the sacramental mysteries that remind us that we are not alone. You are not alone. There are fellow seekers with you, plodding along, having rejected the violence of Herod "to make their way home by another route." The "route" is a commitment to peace, to justice, to mercy. The "route" is extending kindness beyond what we normally would do; the "route" is, perhaps, not a way at all, but a person who embodies all of these things: Jesus himself.

May God bless you this Epiphany, and I pray that (at least insofar as it concerns you and your house), you will hold tightly to the hope of the world and the "bright Morning Star" who will bring all things to their rightful and peaceful conclusion.

ANNUAL MEETING WITH PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL CHANGES + SPR will

gather for its regular Annual Meeting the last Sunday of January, **January 28, 12:30 p.m. via Zoom.** The meeting will only be held via Zoom, allowing members who are away for the winter to join us. On the docket are elections to Parish Council, budget approval, and two constitutional changes that require congregational approval:

- Second ratification of last year's change to establish quorum. Constitutional changes require two affirmative votes in consecutive years. You will recall that this change established that, going forward, a quorum for the Annual Meeting is 40% of the average worship attendance for the previous year as reported on the Parochial Report; this vote will be the second of two and becomes effective immediately upon adoption.
- The Constitution establishes and Endowment Fund, but no Endowment Committee. The Parish Council moves that the Constitution be changed to specifically establish the Endowment Committee as a standing Committee of the Parish Council, specifically referenced in the Constitution. Between this year and next, work will be done to rewrite and establish bylaws for

this committee to streamline its grant process and how its funds are invested. This, too, requires two votes over two consecutive years, and so will take effect (pending approval) in January of 2025.

All baptized and confirmed members may vote, and we hope that you will join us for this important part of our life together. The Zoom link will be in the Friday e-mails starting in January. All you have to do is...click, and you're in!

Thanks to all who volunteer to keep this building and spaces inside in condition to use and rent out.




